

MILLBRAE COMMUNITY YOUTH CENTER

The Millbrae Scout House was built in 1954 by the **Millbrae Lions Club** on Millbrae School District property behind Taylor Middle School. The facility served for many years as a meeting place for local Cub Scout and Boy Scout troops, for Lions Club meetings and functions, and as a location for sign-ups and awards ceremo-

nies for Millbrae youth sports programs. The Scout House was closed up in 1999 due to security and access concerns and has stood vacant and neglected since that time. The status quo, however, is about to undergo a major change.

The historic Scout House is poised for a major renaissance thanks to a joint effort initiated by the **Millbrae Lions Club**, the **City of Millbrae**, and the **Millbrae School District**. Local volunteers have created the **Millbrae Community Youth Center Project** to raise funds to renovate the Scout House and convert it to a community center to meet the needs of Millbrae youth. The remodeled building will provide after-school programs, educational and recreational opportunities for

PRESIDENT'S REPORT JOHN MUNIZ

How time flies - the holidays are just around the corner! That is exactly why we are here, because time flies. The dedicated members of the Millbrae Historical Society are charged with capturing and preserving a time that has long since passed. Our Millbrae Historical Museum and Railroad Museum are prime examples of how our membership preserves an era of historical significance.

This year is the twenty-fifth anniversary of the relocation of the Millbrae Historical Museum to our current location in Civic Center Plaza, across from the Millbrae Library. Prior to 1985, our Museum building was the former home (built in 1898) of one of the Spring Valley Water Company foremen, abandoned for many years on the corner of Broadway and Ludeman Lane. The Millbrae Historical Society, in collaboration with the



City of Millbrae, was able to save the house from the wrecking ball and move it to our current location. At the time in 1985, the Millbrae Historical Society was

already fifteen years old. Today, the City of Millbrae and its residents have a real jewel of museum, set in the heart of Millbrae, for everyone to enjoy for generations to come.

Our curator, **Alma Massolo**, and crew have put together a new ladies' garment exhibit from the late nineteenth century that is "out of this world". For those who are interested in history or need research information on Millbrae and the surrounding area, the Millbrae Historical Museum contains a wealth of information in the form of newspaper articles (from the *Millbrae Sun*) fully indexed, pictures, documents, and maps. For the railroad buff, our Millbrae Historical Society Southern Pacific Railroad Station Museum is another "must see" stop on your itinerary. I love the 1941 "City of San Francisco" Pullman rail car. See how the railroads built this country and how we traveled "in style" before Amtrak. Our Southern Pacific Railroad Museum curator **Vern Bruce** and his crew of docents have an incredible display of railroad memorabilia.

I hope that everyone has had the opportunity to view **Tom and Faye Dawdy's** presentation of "*Growing up in Millbrae*". What a wonderful historic multimedia presentation of Millbrae from long ago! Old-timers and newcomers alike will definitely enjoy the pictures and narration. Check it out on Millbrae Community TV (MCTV) Channel 27 for presentation times.

The Millbrae History Walk, the brainchild of **Joe Teresi**, is just another example of our dedication to the community while preserving our history. Have you tried taking the Millbrae History Walk? It is not difficult - the main loop is only 2.2 miles - and is definitely an enjoyable experience. Invite your family, friends, and out-of-town guests to join you and see the sights of Millbrae's past and present. You can pick up a map/brochure at the Millbrae Museum, City Hall, Recreation Center, or the Library.

At the October 2010 meeting of the Millbrae Historical Society Board of Trustees a new category of membership was approved. We now have a "Lifetime Business Membership" classification. For a one-time four hundred dollar donation to the Millbrae Historical Society, a business will become a Lifetime Member. Each Lifetime Business Member will be presented with a special membership certificate, which can be displayed at their place of business. The Lifetime Business Membership will also entitle the business owner to submit a business card size advertisement which will appear in our quarterly Millbrae Historical Society newsletter for a one-year period. Our members will know which businesses have become Lifetime Members of the Millbrae Historical Society and will be inspired to patronize these generous businesses. If you

A Lifetime Business Membership flyer and application will be going out next month in the Millbrae Chamber of Commerce newsletter.

This past June, our Millbrae Historical Society Board of Trustees voted unanimously to donate five hundred dollars to the **Millbrae Lions Club** Mobile Kitchen Fund. The **Millbrae Lions Club** constructed a completely self-contained, thirty-foot-long enclosed trailer to be used for their fundraising activities and as an emergency response kitchen to be utilized during area disasters. The mobile kitchen proved to be a valuable asset following the San Bruno gas explosion tragedy. Lions Club members used the mobile trailer to feed over two thousand meals to victims, fire, police and aid workers over the course of four days.

The Millbrae Historical Society Board of Trustees also unanimously approved a request from **Millbrae Community TV (MCTV)** for funding to help sustain their operations. MCTV has been an important part of our community and a supporter of the Millbrae Historical Society for many years. Although the Millbrae Historical Society was not chartered as a benevolent organization, considering the state of our economy the MCTV and Millbrae Lions Club donations were well-deserved and warranted.

Want to enjoy an old-fashioned Holiday Party? This year our annual Millbrae Historical Society Holiday party is on **Wednesday, December 8th** at the Museum, commencing at 7:00 pm. Come on down and enjoy refreshments, food, caroling and the company of good friends.

As we bid a fond "farewell" to the old year and ring in a new year, we will again be confronted with many challenges and opportunities. As we move forward to confront our challenges and build on our opportunities, the Millbrae Historical Society will be on the cutting edge when it comes to preserving our great history. Thank you to all our members for being so dedicated to our beautiful museum. Thank you to our Board of Directors for serving faithfully and keeping the wheels of the museum turning.

Our project of sealing windows on the **Civic Center** rail car is well underway. As of this writing, three of the twenty-two windows are done. A lot of time has also already been spent on all of the remaining 19 windows. Each window requires multiple processes of cleaning, priming and painting special corrosion-resistant coatings in order to protect the surfaces. It is now estimated that each window takes a total of 10 to 12 hours of work, with many hours in-between to allow for proper curing of the coatings. Thanks to **Dave Hannigan, Jay King, William Bruce, and Vern Bruce** for contributing their time to this project.



Millbrae youth, evening and summer community programs, and meeting space for classes, clubs, and special events.

organizations, including the Millbrae Historical Society, in order to achieve its financial and strategic




goals. There are two important ways that MHS members can support the Millbrae Community Youth Center (MCCY) Project:
